Gospel Reflection for the Fifth Sunday of Lent "...a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies..." John 12:20-33

Have you ever heard someone ask, "Why do I have to go to church when I can pray at home?"

It is certainly true that we should be praying at home. However, prayer is not enough. God also commands us to <u>worship</u>. And worship is not something we can offer to God alone at home. To worship God, we need two things - a sacrifice and a community to offer it. By its nature, worship is the act of a community offering sacrifice. So, just as I cannot play baseball by myself at home, I cannot worship at home alone. To worship God as He desires, I must come to church.

Now, at Sunday Mass, it is clear that there is a community present. That community is you and I who have gathered here. The Risen Jesus is present in our midst in a real way because of His promise, "For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them" (Mt 18:20 RSV). Because of that, Jesus is present here in a more intense, real, and personal way than I can ever experience it at home by myself.

We are all made in the image and likeness of God, and through our baptism, we have the Holy Spirit dwelling within us. So, we reflect God's glory to one another. To experience this presence of Jesus in my neighbor, I have to leave my house. And while I can certainly encounter Jesus in everyone I meet on the street, it is in this place that we meet Him in an intentional way because we are "gathered in His name."

So, while it is important that we be praying at home, it is also crucial that we be worshiping in church. Otherwise, we will not have that encounter with the living, risen Christ that can transform us.

None of us were alive when Jesus died. However, every time we come to Mass, the saving offering that Jesus made of Himself becomes present to us again as if we were there. Every Sunday, at every Eucharist, we are given access to Calvary, where our Lord died for us.

As a worshiping community, then, we unite the sacrifices we make in living our Christian life to the sacrifice of Jesus. The bread and wine that we offer represent the gift of our very selves that we offer to God through Jesus.


Jesus' sacrifice on the cross was an act of perfect love and obedience to God the Father. Our sacrifices, however, are not perfect. Sometimes, what we do for others is half-hearted. We can be distracted when we pray and we can complain about how hard the good works we perform are or gripe that no one notices or appreciates what we do. To be honest, so much of what we try to do for God is full of selfish motivations. However, when we come to Mass and attach them to the perfect sacrifice of Jesus, they are washed clean and become pleasing to God.

Coming to church and worshiping at Mass does something else for us that praying at home could never do. It teaches us to look at our lives through the lens of sacrifice. We are invited at every Mass to join our sacrifices to that of Jesus. To do that, we have to be making sacrifices. We have to be denying ourselves to serve others. We have to be giving of our times and talents for the benefit of God and His people. The Eucharist challenges us to imitate Jesus by dying to our sinful habits and selfishness so that we can live for Him and others.

Jesus says this quite clearly in today's gospel: "Very truly, I tell you; unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit." Our lives as Christians require that we pick up our cross daily and follow Jesus. By inviting us to unite those daily pains and difficulties to Jesus' own suffering, we learn to view our whole lives as a sacrifice offered to God.


We certainly can and must pray at home. But to worship, we have to come to church, to join this community where the Risen Lord is present to offer His perfect sacrifice to the Father. Like the Greeks in today's gospel, we have come here because we want to see Jesus. Look around. He is here in our midst. In a wonderful way, He will be present to us in bread and wine that will be transformed into His Body and Blood. By joining our sacrifices to His eternal sacrifice, that salvation becomes a reality in our lives. We could never get that by just staying at home.



Each year, the Catholic Faith Appeal (CFA) extends a heartfelt invitation for our Diocese to unite and extend a helping hand to our brothers and sisters in need. It is one of the most effective ways to carry out the work of the Church, and it is a testament to our Catholic Faith in action. Contributions to the CFA play a crucial role in supporting a diverse array of programs and services, including Vocations and Seminarians, Religious Education, aid for financially challenged Parishes and Missions, Evangelization, Catholic Education, Catholic Charities, and more. On an annual basis, Parishes in the Diocese of Venice make a required contribution to financially support these efforts. The Catholic Faith Appeal empowers every parishioner to actively contribute to their Parish's financial commitment, with goals tailored to each Parish's income rather than the number of registered families. This approach accommodates the seasonal influx of northern visitors during the winter months, significantly enhancing the Appeal's success.

How does the CFA benefit my Parish and me?

The Catholic Faith Appeal helps to sustain many diverse programs in our Parishes. Some examples are preparing couples for marriage, providing the curriculum to educate both children and adults in our Faith, forming future priests, educating children in Catholic schools, and supporting religious sisters who serve in various roles. The CFA over the past three years has provided \$5 million to Parishes through donations raised above and beyond their goal. Parishes use the additional funds for a wide variety of purposes as agreed upon by Parish leadership and the Pastor. Some examples are capital improvements, building an endowment for maintenance, tuition assistance or emergency purposes, and expanding community outreach.

Why does Catholic Charities do additional fundraising?

Approximately 13% of the Diocesan budget is given to Catholic Charities to help support its very worthwhile presence in our Diocese. However, this amount is only a percentage of the money needed to carry out its work. In addition to what the Diocese is able to provide, further fundraising is required.

Why are the administrative services included?

The mission of the Church is to continue the work of Christ. To do so requires overseeing and supporting more than 1,000 employees in our schools, Parishes and agencies throughout the ten counties within the Diocese. These shared services help streamline operations and reduce the overall cost for everyone.

Why are there so many mailings?

More than 3.5 million dollars of the appeal comes to the Diocese through the mailings. Once you have responded to a CFA mailing or made a gift through your Parish, mailings to you will stop with the exception of a thank you letter and yearly tax receipt. Tax receipts are sent to anyone who gives a gift of \$250 or more, which is required by the IRS. It is always wise to keep receipts of your charitable giving for audit purposes.

How much should I give?

In prayerful thanks for the many blessings from God, we as Stewards should reflect an attitude of gratitude by sharing those blessings with our brothers and sisters in need through contributions to our Parish or the CFA. Although we are not all able to make an equal gift, all are invited by Our Lord to make an equal sacrifice. Therefore, your gift is a personal decision between you and God, and should be made after prayerful consideration.

Should I make a pledge or a one-time gift?

Making a pledge allows you to spread your gift throughout the year, which may make it easier for you to pay, and may also allow you to give a larger gift. Pledge statements are sent out monthly unless otherwise requested. These are simply reminders and not bills. You can pay your pledge anytime before the end of the year. If your situation changes, you may also adjust your pledge.

How can I make my gift?

We try to make your giving as easy as possible! You can make a gift through checks, credit cards, stocks, direct debit, IRA transfer, on-line giving at www.dioceseofvenice.org, as well as approved gifts of real estate. Give us a call and we will happily answer your questions (941-486-4719).

Will any funds from the CFA be used to settle lawsuits or for legal expenses?

No, the Catholic Faith Appeal funds are restricted for the funding of the ministries and programs outlined in promotional materials and are not used to settle claims or pay claim related expenses.

If I contribute to my Parish's capital campaign, does the Diocese get a portion of my gift?

Funds from approved Parish capital campaigns are not assessable. Therefore, the fully donated amount is available for use by the Parish for capital campaign purposes.

Saint Joseph's Feast Day Mass in Italian and Saint Joseph's Table with Father Mayer Tuesday, March 19, 2024 8:15am Mass

While Saint Joseph and Father's Day are celebrated all over Italy, the celebration
of Saint Joseph is more prominent in Southern Italy, particularly Sicily.
Considered by Sicilians as the Patron Saint of their region, Saint Joseph is
credited to have saved Sicily's residents during one of their many devastating
droughts. Tradition has it that residents prayed to Saint Joseph for rain. The rain
came, and as such, their spring crops were spared from being destroyed,
preventing a widespread famine for Sicily. It is widely believed that this is the
reason the celebration is held in March.

We will start our Saint Joseph Day celebration on Tuesday, March 19 with Mass in Italian at 8:15am. We will also have a traditional Saint Joseph Table.

What is a Saint Joseph's Table

Generally, a statue of St. Joseph is placed at the head of the table and is surrounded by gifts of various foods, citrus fruits, and of course, breads. On the feast day, an open house is held, inviting friends and family to join in the celebration of eating the gifts left on the table. Fava beans, one of the spared crops, represent good luck and abundance, so be sure to add them to your table.

As with anything in Italy, the menu for a Saint Joseph celebration is rooted in tradition. Because the holiday falls during lent and this year on Friday, meat is not eaten on the feast day. Foods containing breadcrumbs, or the "poor man's parmigiano" are enjoyed. Joseph, as you might know, was a carpenter, so breadcrumbs are eaten to resemble the sawdust left behind after a day's work in the carpenter's shop. Lemons, like fava beans, are said to bring good luck.

While fava beans, lemons, breads and seafood are frequently eaten on the feast day of San Giuseppe, and are certainly delicious; we will begin our Saint Joseph's Table tradition this year by bringing BREAD.

Bring in your bread, clearly labeled, for Father Mayer to bless.

Mark your calendars! Monday, February 19th we will begin our Lenten Soup & Stations. Followed by each Monday in February and March.

We will have soup, bread, finger desserts and fellowship from 4:00-5:15 pm in the Parish Center, followed by Stations of the Cross at 6:00 pm in the Church. The Parish Women's Guild hosts the Lenten Soup Suppers with help from many of the Saint Francis Ministry groups. This year, we are asking all parishioners to participate in the Lenten Soup & Stations. You can decide what is best for you and your family. We have three ways for you to participate this year:

- 1. Volunteer to bring soup or a finger dessert on any Monday(s) during Lent. Call the Parish Office to sign up to bring soup or desserts. 941-697-4899
 - 2. Come and participate. Bring your family, neighbors, and friends and enjoy a bowl of homemade soup and dessert. Support this event each Monday during Lent.

3. We invite you to Walk with Jesus after soup, join us in the Church for Stations of the Cross beginning at 6:00 pm with Deacon Bob. The Church encourages us to participate in the Stations of the Cross, especially during Lent. The Stations of the Cross, which exist in most Catholic churches today, began as a practice of pious pilgrims to Jerusalem who would retrace the final journey of Jesus Christ to Calvary. Over time, a practice developed for pilgrims, who could not travel to the Holy Land, so they could do so in a devotional, spiritual way in their hearts. Since this practice is rooted in a pilgrimage, it is ideal for participants to move from station to station just like those leading it (or at least turn to face each station). This movement reminds us to ask God for the grace and courage to follow Christ in carrying our daily crosses so as to share in the light of the resurrection of the Lord.


